BACKGROUND:

Per Resolution 2018-2729, community organizations desiring funding from the City must submit applications to the city secretary's office. Once all applications are received, the City Secretary's Office processes the applications and submits the requests to the City Council for review.

Requests must meet the following criteria:

- Services to be provided by an organized civic, cultural, educational, or service group that is a nonprofit organization with membership open to all citizens of Highland Village
- Services must be of economic benefit to the community or contribute to the quality of life in Highland Village by serving a municipal public purpose
- Services must be provided to the citizens of Highland Village on an equal basis
- The organization must enter into a written contract with the City of Highland Village for the provision of services

Examples of municipal public purpose include, but are not limited to:

- Preservation, promotion or development of historically sensitive areas of the city
- Promotion of the performing arts
- Activities promoting and improving the health, safety and welfare of the youth, adults or senior citizens in the city
- Educational programs promoting student and citizen participation in the electoral process and local government
- Crime awareness and prevention

City Council may consider written requests for financial assistance and determine allocation amounts, if any, for the community nonprofit organizations. Council has historically allocated 0.25% of the City's Maintenance & Operations budget (excluding capital project or purchasing funds) for nonprofit organizations. There is \$46,100 included in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget for funding community services and activities provided by nonprofit organizations.

A copy of all applications have been provided to Council for consideration and Council received presentations from representatives of the following nonprofit organizations at their regular meeting held October 27, 2020: CASA of Denton County, Chisholm Trail RSVP, Communities in Schools of North Texas, Friends of the Flower Mound Public Library, Highland Village Lions Foundation, Journey to Dream, Lewisville ISD Education Foundation

(LEF), Lewisville Lake Symphony, PediPlace, Special Abilities of North Texas, The Salvation Army, SPAN/Meals on Wheels, Winning the Fight, and Youth and Family Counseling. Due to COVID-19, Denton County Friends of the Family was unable to send a representative.

2. Discuss a Supplemental Agreement to the Solid Waste, Recycling, and Household Hazardous Waste Collection Contract with Community Waste Disposal (CWD) relative to a Requested Rate Adjustment relating to the Closing of DFW Landfill

Assistant City Manager Ken Heerman reported Community Waste Disposal (CWD) requested an additional rate increase to mitigate ongoing increased operating costs resulting from the closing of the DFW Landfill. The annual CPI increase provided for in the current collection contract already addresses the increased cost related to the gate rate of the alternate landfill (City of Denton) secured by CWD. However, the increased distance of the Denton Landfill from Highland Village results in increased operating costs that are not addressed.

As the closing of the DFW Landfill was unexpected, CWD has requested the City consider an additional rate increase accordingly. Mr. Heerman stated there is no provision in the contract other than the established CPI annual adjustment to address rate adjustments based on this type of event. CWD's request for Council to consider further relief will require an agreement to make a one-time adjustment in CWD's collection rates beyond the amount allowed in the contract, if Council is so inclined. As this is solely Council discretion, City staff had no recommendation. However, to facilitate Council evaluation, staff provided CWD with a suggested parameter of only addressing tangible incremental operating variable costs associated with the landfill closing. This would primarily involve labor cost and vehicle cost (fuel, maintenance). Mr. Heerman stated an item is included on tonight's meeting agenda should Council choose to take action on a Supplemental Agreement.

CWD's request reflects a monthly increase of \$.57 for residential accounts, primarily reflective of estimated increased delivery time to the landfill, franchise and applicable sales tax; commercial rate would be adjusted similarly. Councilmember Kixmiller asked what the volume increase has been with more people at home now due to COVID-19. CWD President/CEO Mr. Greg Roemer reported about 13% from residential trash volume,

adding that he is not asking to cover that with the rate increase, but just to cover the transportation increase.

Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Fleming asked the life expectancy of the Denton Landfill. Mr. Roemer stated he was not sure, but their contract with the City of Denton end in three (3) years.

14. Consider Resolution 2020-2915 approving the Annual Rate Adjustment pursuant to the Solid Waste, Recycling, and Household Hazardous Waste Collection Contract with Community Waste Disposal (CWD)

APPROVED (7 - 0)

Assistant City Manager Ken Heerman reported as part of the contract with CWD, updated rates can be considered annually and are based on three criteria: DFW Consumer Price Index (CPI), the change in US Price of Natural Gas sold to Commercial Customers Index and the percentage change in the gate rate charged to CWD by the disposal site they utilize. Applying these factors, including sales tax, would result in a \$1.12 increase to each residential customer.

Additionally, the City also incurs a separate charge associated with processing of compost from another vendor, which equates to a \$.25 additional pass-through charge. Due to a credit balance associated with the composting, the associated charge has been temporarily withheld over the past year, but now needs to be reinstated.

Motion by Councilmember Heslep, seconded by Councilmember Kixmiller, to approve Resolution 2020-2915. Motion carried 7-0.

15. Consider Resolution 2020-2916 approving a Supplemental Agreement to the Solid Waste, Recycling, and Household Hazardous Waste Collection Contract with Community Waste Disposal (CWD) regarding a Rate Adjustment relating to the Closing of DFW Landfill

APPROVED (7 - 0)

Mr. Heerman reported CWD requested a supplemental agreement to their current contract to include a rate increase to mitigate the ongoing increased operating costs resulting from the unexpected closing of the DFW Landfill in December 2019. With the closing of the DFW Landfill, CWD secured a contract with the City of Denton to use their landfill, which

resulted in additional labor and vehicle costs. Applying the increase, franchise and applicable sales tax would result in a total increase of \$.57 to each residential customer, with commercial rates adjusted similarly.

Motion by Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Fleming, seconded by Councilmember Fiester, to approve Resolution 2020-2916. Motion carried 7-0.

This information reports that the beginning market value for all cash and investments was \$20,592,638 and the ending market value on September 30, 2020 was \$18,402,965. The average yield for the quarter ending September 30, 2020 in pooled, demand deposit, negotiable order of withdrawal, and money market accounts (0.30%) is less than the six-month term treasuries. The beginning pool, demand deposit, negotiable order of withdrawal, and money market accounts invested balance at June 30, 2020 was \$14,737,314 and the ending balance at September 30, 2020 was \$13,562,151 or 74% of the City's total portfolio. The weighted average maturity of the City's portfolio at September 30, 2020 is 28 days.

The average total portfolio yield for the quarter ending September 30, 2020 was 0.64%.


Economic Overview 9/30/2020

The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) maintained the Fed Funds target range at 0.00% to 0.25% (Effective Fed Funds are trading +/-0.10%), and projected that reduced rates could remain through 2024. Final estimate of Second Quarter GDP revised to down 31.4% (from down 31.9%). The Yield Curve remained stable. Crude oil slid to below \$40 per barrel. September Non Farm Payroll added 661k workers. Business added over 800k, but governments shed 200+k. The Stock Markets retreated slightly from all-time highs. Housing strengthened due to low mortgage rates. Additional federal economic assistance remained stalled in Congress.




Portfolio Composition

BACKGROUND:

The America's Water Infrastructure Act (AWIA) of 2018 is an unfunded EPA mandate that requires the City to certify that a risk and resilience assessment has been done for the City's water system. A similar risk and resilience assessment was performed for the City's water system in 2004 called a Vulnerability Assessment. This AWIA project will consist of an updated 2021 risk and resilience assessment to meet the current requirements. This assessment will include the following tasks: 1) Planning, 2) Threat Assessment, 3) Facility Characterization, 4) System Effectiveness, and 5) Risk Analysis and Risk Management. The due date for completion of this risk and resilience assessment for cities with the population the size of Highland Village is June 30, 2021.

IDENTIFIED NEED/S:

A risk and resilience assessment is mandated to be conducted for the City's water infrastructure. This assessment must be completed by June 30, 2021.

OPTIONS & RESULTS:

This proposed risk and resilience assessment of the City's water system will ensure that the City meets the requirements of the America's Water Infrastructure Act (AWIA) of 2018.

PROGRESS TO DATE: (if appropriate)

A Task Order has been received from Schaumburg and Polk, Inc. (SPI) for the provision of professional services required for this project. Pipeline Analysis, LLC will assist SPI with technical components of the assessment.

BUDGETARY IMPACT/ORDINANCE CHANGE: (if appropriate)

The funds for this project are budgeted in the FY20-21 Utility Fund.

BACKGROUND:

In 2003, the Texas Legislature passed a Municipal Setting Designation (MSD) statute which created a new alternative for persons addressing the groundwater contamination they were responsible for causing, as well as for persons who "volunteer" to address groundwater contamination.

An MSD is an official state designation given to property within a municipality or its extraterritorial jurisdiction which certifies that designated groundwater at the property is not used as potable water. Potable water is defined as water that is used for drinking, showering, bathing, cooking, or for irrigating crops intended for human consumption. Because that groundwater is contaminated in excess of the applicable potable-water protective concentration level, this law prohibits its future use as potable water. Through this locally-controlled program, the prohibition against using the designated groundwater must either be in the form of a city ordinance or as a restrictive covenant that is enforceable by the city and filed in the property records. This law also limits investigation and remediation requirements for contaminated groundwater on MSD properties. By offering this alternative to address the problem of contaminated groundwater that will not be used as potable water, persons may be more inclined to develop and redevelop properties in municipal areas that have contaminated groundwater.

The TCEQ has issued a few hundred MSD Certificates, with all but a few being in the DFW area. The City of Lewisville has several MSD Certificates within their corporate limits.

The City of Lewisville approved Ordinance 0265-20-ORD (attached) prohibiting the use of the groundwater under said property.

The proposed MSD Site is the Denton County Transportation Authority (DCTA) Rail Maintenance Facility located on South Railroad Street (but addressed as 640 E State Highway 121 Business, Lewisville, Texas). Highland Village has been approached by DCTA's environmental consultant with a request to submit a support resolution for DCTA's application to the TCEQ to designate the DCTA Rail Maintenance Facility property as an MSD site. A portion of the property was used as an unpermitted landfill prior to DCTA's purchase of the property and is presently undeveloped. Designating the property as an MSD will permit the undeveloped property to be developed in the future with any clean up of the property being subject to less stringent requirements.

IDENTIFIED NEED/S:

Three (3) of the City's five (5) ground water wells fall within the 5 mile radius of the proposed MSD, (See Attachment B). Therefore, the property owner is required to have support from Highland Village to apply for the MSD Certificate through the TCEQ.

OPTIONS & RESULTS:

NA

PROGRESS TO DATE: (if appropriate)

City of Lewisville staff informed City of Highland Village staff that the contamination is made up of Tetrachloroethene, Arsenic and Manganese and the contamination is moving away from Highland Village in a southern direction. The Environmental consultant has concluded that the contaminated site is not hydro-geologically connected to the City's groundwater supply.

BUDGETARY IMPACT/ORDINANCE CHANGE: (if appropriate)

ORDINANCE NO. <u>0265-20-ORD</u>

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE OF AND CONTACT WITH DESIGNATED GROUNDWATER FROM BENEATH THE DESIGNATED PROPERTY GENERALLY DESCRIBED AS TWO REAL PROPERTIES (DCTA MAINTENANCE FACILITY ADDITION, BLOCK A, LOTS 1 AND 2), 640 TEXAS 121 BUSINESS LEWISVILLE, TEXAS, TO FACILITATE CERTIFICATION OF A MUNICIPAL SETTING DESIGNATION ("MSD") OF SAID PROPERTY BY THE TEXAS COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ("TCEQ"), PURSUANT TO THE TEXAS SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL ACT; PROVIDING FOR A REPEALER, SEVERABILITY, A PENALTY, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE: AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Chapter 361, Subchapter W, of the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act authorizes the TCEQ to certify Municipal Setting Designations for properties upon receipt and approval of a proper application to the TCEQ; and,

WHEREAS, the Texas legislature, in enacting Chapter 361, Subchapter W, of the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act, found that an action by a municipality to restrict access to or the use of groundwater in support of or to facilitate an MSD advances a substantial and legitimate state interest where the quality of the groundwater subject to the designation is an actual or potential threat to human health; and,

WHEREAS, as part of the application process for an MSD, an applicant is required to provide the TCEQ with a statement as to whether the municipality in which the MSD is being sought supports the proposed designation, and an ordinance that prohibits the use of designated groundwater beneath that property as potable water and that appropriately restricts other uses of and contact with that groundwater; and,

WHEREAS, due to limited quantity and low quality, there are areas of shallow groundwater within the City and its extraterritorial jurisdiction that are not valuable as potable water sources and therefore are not utilized for potable water; and,

WHEREAS, some commercial and industrial properties within the City and its extraterritorial jurisdiction are underlain with unusable groundwater that has become contaminated by historical on-site or off-site sources; and,

WHEREAS, the potable use of groundwater in designated areas should be prohibited to protect public health and welfare when the quality of the groundwater presents an actual or potential threat to public health; and,

WHEREAS, the use of an MSD allows for a state-evaluated corrective action process for groundwater that is directed towards the protection of human health and the environment; and,

WHEREAS, Terracon Consultants, Inc., on behalf of Denton County Transit Authority, or DCTA, ("Applicant") intends to submit an application to the TCEQ for certification of an MSD for the property located generally at 640 Texas 121 Business, as shown and described by metes and bounds in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof ("MSD Property"), and said MSD Property is located within the city limits of the City of Lewisville; and,

WHEREAS, the Applicant has certified that the type of known contaminants in the groundwater beneath the MSD property, including contaminants of concern as defined in Lewisville City Code Section 16-395, are as set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and made a part hereof, and that such contaminated groundwater (the "designated groundwater") has a maximum depth of twenty-five (25) feet below ground surface; and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has certified to the City that:

- 1. The purpose of the application is to assist the Applicant in obtaining from the TCEQ closure documentation demonstrating the TCEQ's determination, after completion of any remediation requirements and appropriate review by the TCEQ, that no further environmental cleanup or restoration is required by the TCEQ with respect to the MSD Property; and,
- 2. As a part of the application, the Applicant has or will submit to the TCEQ a statement regarding the type of known contamination in the groundwater beneath the MSD Property and has identified that shallow groundwater contains chemicals of concern above Tier 1 groundwater ingestion protective concentration levels, as set forth in 30 Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 350, the Texas Risk Reduction Program; and,

WHEREAS, the Applicant has continuing obligations to satisfy applicable statutory and regulatory provisions concerning groundwater contamination investigation and response actions at the MSD Property; and

WHEREAS, a public drinking water supply system exists that satisfies the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Chapter 341 that supplies or is capable of supplying drinking water to the MSD Property and property within one-half mile of the MSD Property; and

WHEREAS, a public meeting regarding the proposed MSD application was held on October 7, 2020, in accordance with Chapter 16, Article IX (Municipal Setting Designations) of the City's Code of Ordinances, at which the Applicant or Applicant's representative did appear and have the opportunity to present, and at which members of the affected community were given the opportunity to ask the Applicant questions or make oral comments on the Application; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a public hearing regarding the proposed MSD application, in accordance with Chapter 16, Article IX (Municipal Setting Designations) of the City's Code of Ordinances, at which the Applicant or Applicant's representative did appear and present the request for approval of the MSD application and at which persons wishing to speak either in favor of or against the application were provided the opportunity to speak; and

WHEREAS, the office of sustainability manager did, prior to the public hearing, provide the City Council with a written report summarizing the request for the MSD application approval, including any staff comments and comments of members of the public from the public meeting, in accordance with Chapter 16, Article IX (Municipal Setting Designations) of the City's Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the City Council supports the proposed MSD designation of the MSD property; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes it is in the best interest of the public and the City to facilitate the Applicant's efforts to secure an MSD and TCEQ closure documentation by passage of this Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEWISVILLE, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds the declarations and findings set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are true and correct and are incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. The City Council finds this ordinance is necessary because the contaminant concentrations of contaminants of concern, as defined in Lewisville City Code Section 16-395, a list of which is included in Attachment "B", exceed TCEQ potable water standards.

SECTION 3. The City Council finds it is in the best interest and welfare of the public to facilitate TCEQ's certification of an MSD for the MSD Property as well as the TCEQ closure documentation.

SECTION 4. Upon and after the effective date of this Ordinance, the drilling of wells and use of designated groundwater for any purpose is hereby prohibited on or from any portion of the

MSD Property, including but not limited to drilling and use of designated groundwater for use as potable water, as defined in Section 361.801, Texas Health & Safety Code, and excepting only: (i) wells used as monitoring wells for the collection of groundwater samples for chemical or biological laboratory analysis; and (ii) wells used for the purpose of remediation of soil or groundwater contamination,.

SECTION 5. Failure of the Applicant to diligently pursue and obtain from the TCEQ an MSD certificate for the MSD Property and TCEQ closure documentation for the MSD Property shall render this Ordinance voidable by the City Council following 30 days' written notice to the TCEQ and the Applicant.

SECTION 6. REPEALER. Every ordinance or parts of ordinances found to be in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses, or phrases of this ordinance, but they shall remain in effect.

SECTION 8. PENALTY. Any person, firm or corporation who violates any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof in the Municipal Court, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$2000.00 for each offense, and each and every day such offense is continued shall constitute a new and separate offense.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 10. EMERGENCY. It being for the public welfare that this ordinance be passed creates an emergency and public necessity, and the rule requiring this ordinance be read on three separate occasions be, and the same is hereby waived, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval and publication, as the law in such cases provides.



WHEREAS, as part of the application to TCEQ for a MSD, Texas Health and Safety Code §361.8065(a) requires the applicant to notify each municipality that owns or operates a groundwater supply well located within five miles of a site proposed for a MSD of the application for MSD for said site and to obtain a resolution of support from the governing body of each such municipality for the MSD application; and

WHEREAS, at the request of the Denton County Transportation Authority ("Applicant"), the City Council of the City of Lewisville ("Lewisville") approved City of Lewisville Ordinance No. 0265-20-ORD ("the Lewisville Ordinance") supporting an application for MSD for the property located at 640 State Highway 121 Business in the City of Lewisville, said property being more particularly described as Lots 1 and 2, Block A of DCTA Maintenance Facility Addition, Lots 1 & 2, Block A, an addition to the City of Lewisville, according to the plat thereof recorded in Volume 2010-158, Plat Records, Denton County, Texas ("the Proposed MSD Site"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Highland Village owns and operates a groundwater supply well located not more than five miles from the proposed MSD site that provides potable water to customers of the City's public water supply system; and

WHEREAS, as required by law, the Applicant has provided the notice to the City of Highland Village of the application for the MSD for the Proposed MSD Site and requested that the City Council of the City of Highland Village, Texas, provide a resolution supporting said application; and

WHEREAS, Applicant's environmental consultant has provided information to City staff indicating that the designated groundwater supply beneath the Proposed MSD Site is down gradient from and not hydro-geologically connected with the groundwater source from which the City's public water supply wells draw groundwater; and

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed the materials received from the Applicant's consultant and finds no reason to object to the MSD application for the Proposed MSD Site; and

WHEREAS, in the spirit of cooperation with and support of the City of Lewisville in its the efforts to provide for the redevelopment of property within its corporate limits, and as a founding member of the Applicant, the City Council of the City of Highland Village, finds it to be in the public interest to support the proposed MSD application;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, TEXAS THAT:

BACKGROUND:

The City's 750,000 gallon Unity Park Elevated Storage Tank (EST) was designed and constructed in '07-'08. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) requires that steel water storage tanks be repainted periodically. Repainting steel water storage tanks facilitates maintenance, enhances their appearance, and prolongs their useful life. The City's water reservoir painting program places the City's water tanks on a 10-year painting schedule. The Unity Park EST is 12-years old and inspections reveal the need to repaint the tank. A City logo is in the plans to be added on the EST bowl that will face the FM407 / Briarhill intersection.

Bids were received on October 29, 2020 for the project from general contractors. Sixteen responsive bids from contractors were received. They are the following:

of a Pass-Through Compost Fee on First Reading

BACKGROUND:

At the October 27, 2020 Council Meeting, Council approved Resolution 2020-2917 approving updated garbage rates. Included in the garbage rate discussion with Council was a separate component concerning reinstatement of a suspended charge for processing compost. Community Waste Disposal collects yard waste from residents on Mondays of each week and delivers to the City's vendor, Living Earth (LETCO), for processing. The delivery charge is included in the garbage rate. But the charge from LETCO to process the delivered yard waste into compost is billed separately to the City. Accordingly, a compost fee sufficient to address actual cost incurred by the City is billed to residents as a pass-through charge.

Due to various factors, a credit balance had accumulated with collected compost fees. As a result, the fee was temporarily suspended in late 2017 to extinguish the credit balance. With the credit balance now eliminated, Staff had intended to reinstate the compost fee of \$.25 in conjunction with this year's annual garbage rate adjustment, as articulated in the discussion with City Council. However, we subsequently discovered that rather than being suspended, the compost fee was instead repealed by ordinance. This previous action requires reinstatement of the fee by ordinance in order to collect the fee going forward.

IDENTIFIED NEED/S:

The November utility bills reflected the updated compost fee. With discovery of the fee being previously repealed, a credit will be issued for the November overpayment. Accordingly, a corresponding \$.25 credit will be applied to the December billing. But to maintain the compost program, there is need to reinstate the fee. The proposed ordinance provides for reinstatement of the compost fee as a pass-through charge to be adjusted as needed in conjunction with actual charges billed to the City.

OPTIONS & RESULTS:

The reinstatement of the compost fee by ordinance will allow the City to collect the fee as approved on the adjusted CWD rate schedule approved by the City Council at the October 27, 2020 council meeting, but the start of collection of the fee will be delayed until January 2021.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, TEXAS, ENACTING AND AUTHORIZING COLLECTION A COMPOSTING PROGRAM FEE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the City Council previously enacted Ordinance No. 08-1053 authorizing the assessment and collection of a fee to fund the City's composting and hazardous waste programs to provide for disposal of yard waste and household hazardous waste generated by the City's residents; and

WHEREAS, over time, the costs relating to the City's composting program were less than anticipated, resulting in an accumulated credit balance from the compost fee assessed to residents; and

WHEREAS, the composting program fee was repealed by Ordinance No. 2017-1236; and

WHEREAS, the credit balance with the City's composting service vendor has over time been eliminated; and

WHEREAS, City Administration recommends reinstatement of the composting program fee if the City Council desires to continue providing a program for composting residential yard waste; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it to be in the public interest to continue providing a residential yard waste composting program and providing for funds to pay for such program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND VILLAGE, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. Effective for the first utility billing following the effective date of this Ordinance, there is hereby imposed on each residential solid waste collection account a fee in the amount of \$0.25 per month to be collected and used by the City to pay the costs for composting residential yard waste and other compostable household solid waste.

SECTION 2. Should any sentence, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or section of this Ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, and shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its date of passage after second reading and publication as required by law or charter.

BACKGROUND:

Per Resolution 2018-2729, community organizations desiring funding from the City must submit applications to the city secretary's office. Once all applications are received, the City Secretary's Office processes the applications and submits the requests to the City Council for review.

Requests must meet the following criteria:

- Services to be provided by an organized civic, cultural, educational, or service group that is a nonprofit organization with membership open to all citizens of Highland Village
- Services must be of economic benefit to the community or contribute to the quality of life in Highland Village by serving a municipal public purpose
- Services must be provided to the citizens of Highland Village on an equal basis
- The organization must enter into a written contract with the City of Highland Village for the provision of services

Examples of municipal public purpose include, but are not limited to:

- Preservation, promotion or development of historically sensitive areas of the city
- Promotion of the performing arts
- Activities promoting and improving the health, safety and welfare of the youth, adults or senior citizens in the city
- Educational programs promoting student and citizen participation in the electoral process and local government
- Crime awareness and prevention

IDENTIFIED NEED/S:

City Council will consider written requests for financial assistance and determine allocation amounts, if any, for the community nonprofit organizations. Council has historically allocated 0.25% of the City's Maintenance & Operations budget (excluding capital project or purchasing funds) for nonprofit organizations. There is \$46,100 included in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget for funding community services and activities provided by nonprofit organizations.

OPTIONS & RESULTS:

To identify nonprofit organizations that will receive funding as allocated in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget.

PROGRESS TO DATE: (if appropriate)

A copy of all applications have been provided to Council for consideration and Council received presentations from representatives of the following nonprofit organizations at their regular meeting held October 27, 2020: CASA of Denton County, Chisholm Trail RSVP, Communities in Schools of North Texas, Friends of the Flower Mound Public Library, Highland Village Lions Foundation, Journey to Dream, Lewisville ISD Education Foundation (LEF), Lewisville Lake Symphony, PediPlace, Special Abilities of North Texas, The Salvation Army, SPAN/Meals on Wheels, Winning the Fight, and Youth and Family Counseling.
